From 21st June to 7th July 325 people across 84 teams, throughout the UK, stretched their legs over the course of two weeks, logging their activity as they worked together to circumnavigate the globe, a target of 600,023 km so a serious challenge. Now in its third year, #StepintoSummer23 is sponsored by Buro Happold, Fulkers Bailey Russell and Stride Treglown, the aim was to raise awareness for two charities, Women's Aid and Girls out Loud, while encouraging everyone to enjoy getting active. The 2023 Regional Student Awards

Once again the Student Awards have not disappointed. 53 universities across the UK nominated 109 students, some of the top built environment students in the country. Jennifer Winyard, National Vice Chair, explains how the Awards process works.

"Sponsored nationally by Amazon, Bouygues UK, Savills and tp bennett, the Awards are now in their 17th year – they were originally introduced as a one-off celebration, to mark the 20th anniversary of Women in Property but were so successful and have continued to grow in popularity, so have become a core pillar of our work. They bring together academia with industry, help hone the students' skills and, for many, lead to work placements and employment. We also offer all nominated students free membership of Women in Property for one year, which gives

them access to our Mentoring programme.

Every Autumn our branch Awards ambassadors – all volunteers – invite universities to nominate their top female 2nd year students (3rd year in Scotland). In the spring they go before a judging panel to present a piece of coursework and are assessed on their interpersonal skills, CV, knowledge of their subject and thoughts on the built environment in general. The winners are announced at regional Awards events in the early summer, so we now know who will be going



forward to the national final on 21st September. This is when the judges seek to find out more about them as individuals, what makes them tick, what are their views of the industry?

That same evening, we hold the <u>Best of the Best Awards Dinner</u> at Claridge's, a fabulous event, when we celebrate the 14 national finalists and discover who has won the top prize. Why not join us at Claridge's – you might find your next recruit among the finalists!"

The Awards in pictures



Branch News



Central Scotland Over 100 guests joined the Central Scotland branch at Citation, Glasgow to network and celebrate the achievements of this year's Student Awards winners, while taking the opportunity to present a cheque for £15,000 to The Polar Academy, the charity partner of the annual dinner. The Polar Academy works with invisible children: those impacted by bullying, bereavement or abuse, and turn them into resilient role models through an intensive year-long training programme which culminates in a sledge-hauling trip across Greenland. As The Polar Academy increases their impact working with more schools and pupils, the funds from WiP are vital in enabling them to continue their mission.



North West Members took part in a joint sponsored walk with Women in Social Housing (WISH) and Glenbrook to raise money for the Diane Modahl Sports Foundation. Diane Modhal spoke of her inspiring story and career at the branch's International Women's Day event in March. Her charity raises funds to support young people in Manchester in accessing both sports and educational activities, building their skills for life. A team of 17 completed the 26km Three Shires Walk with Three Points at Shutlingsloe, Cheeks Hill and Shining Tor.

South East

Committee member Meg Taylor, has recently qualified as a mental health first aid trainer and is bringing her



passion for helping people to South East branch events. Over 30 people signed up for an introduction to meditation session, and she arranged a wonderful Shinrin Yoku (Forest Bathing) event held in Epping Forest. Meg is organising <u>another session</u> in Richmond Park in August, as well as running weekly online meditation sessions. More will be arranged in the autumn if there is demand.



South Wales The branch held a very successful breakfast event, 'The SuDS Experience', focusing on sustainable drainage systems. Sponsored and hosted by committee member Michelle James of the Urbanists, the breakfast seminar sold out with 60 attendees and a waiting list. The event involved breakfast networking over pastries and coffee followed by a presentation and Q&A.

South West The Bristol Temple Quarter was the subject of a very popular walking tour and a great chance for members to hear directly from the council and project stakeholders on the UK's largest regeneration project. Over the next 25 years it will transform over 130 hectares of brownfield land into a series



of thriving, well-connected mixed-use communities. 10,000 new homes and thousands of new jobs will be created and £1.6bn annual income will be brought to the city economy.



Yorkshire and North East: Sponsored by Hollis and MPG, the Leeds Summer Party held at Issho Rooftop Bar & Restaurant was a sell-out success, attracting a wide range of members and non-members for an evening of networking and collaboration.

Members also attended an informative site study at the Envision Gigafactory in Sunderland. The size and scale of this project is staggering, with a total footprint equal to 23 football pitches. The team is working to an aggressive programme, turning over £20m a month, involving off site manufacturing, in order to hit the construction deadline of 20th September 2024.





Maddie Difazio-Wright is Vice-Vice Chair of Women in Property in the South West and is also one third of the Atlantic Ocean Rowing Team 'Vibe the Wave.'

Their aim is to achieve something extraordinary - crossing The Atlantic Ocean isn't something people do every day and is not for the faint hearted. More people have been to space than have crossed an ocean!
